Bill Wyman: (20<sup>th</sup> cent.) member of Rolling Stones pop group, owns Gedding Hall

Mr. J. Gibson Jarvis (1883-1964): Chairman of United Dominions Trust. He was also a Liveryman of the City of London, a Burgess of City of Glasgow and High Sheriff of Suffolk (1951)

# 25. Other information:

Gedding Hall: said originally to have been built (1273), rebuilt in 15<sup>th</sup> century by Chamberlain family. Moated (water door to moat). Ancient gatehouse (circa 1530) incorporated within mansion. Foundations, walls of larger house/castle still visible (1910). Extended and repaired (1896/7) Bricks around entrance door came from demolished Rushbrooke Hall.

Gedding Park: held only surviving herd of Suffolk Dun Poll cattle – purchased by Lord Iveagh (1904)

Small post mill in existence (1852), second mill added (moved from Felsham 1867). This manoeuvre required 18 shire horses and took two days. New mill built (1905). Used as blacksmiths since (1940)
