Beacon Hill: Brick mansion in park of approximately 24 acres 19th cent. 9th Earle of Albemarle moved to this house after disposing of Quidenham Hall Norfolk.

Troops said to have marched from Ipswich and assembled in the parish where they were joined Woodbridge men under command of Major General Lord Charles Fitzroy, Lord Paget and Major General Smith. Assembly recorded as being of 10,000 men.

Fire at air base caused extreme damage i.e. hanger, its aircraft and equipment completely destroyed 1922.
