Sir John Sulyard: (15th cent.) Lord Chief Justice of England (1483), among first to take up arms and levy men in Queen Mary's service against supporters of Lady Jane Grey. Given manor of Haughley in return for his loyalty. Part of his home at Wetherden Hall remains in a farmhouse of that name.

Robert Rosier: (circa 1556) believed to be of Mutton Hall (a Protestant) said to have been arrested by Sir John Sulyard and burned at stake in field on Wetherden-Woolpit road at Brennen (Burning) Hill.

25. Other information:

Wetherden Hall: Ancient mansion pulled down (15 th cent.) and present mansion built by Sir John Sulyard. Mary I (16 th cent.) said to have stayed at Wetherden Hall on her way to claim the throne. 'An Historical Tale of the Days of Queen Mary' by Rev. A. Brown (19 th cent.)

House in village said to be meeting place of supporters of Lady Jane Grey even though the Lord of the Manor supported Queen Mary.
